Amendment to the Regulation (EU) No 1025/2012 European standardisation

BusinessEurope welcomes the opportunity to provide feedback on the proposed amendment to the Regulation (EU) No 1025/2012 European Standardisation.

Standardisation is a key priority for our members and its governance is a strategic question. Therefore, we reiterate the importance to involve and properly consult stakeholders on these important issues. While we remain convinced that the Regulation (EU) No 1025/2012 is fit for purpose, based on our members' experience, and in a spirit of cooperation, we provide the following feedback.

The European Standardisation System broadly provides for a well-balanced system to serve European interests, notably through the well-established national delegation principle. Therefore, BusinessEurope welcomes the ambition to promote good governance principles through further involvement of NSBs in the decision-making processes for the development of Harmonised European standards.

Nevertheless, we underline the necessity to distinguish the governance from the process of development of standards which should unconditionally remain market-driven and inclusive with industry and other stakeholders in the driving seat. The success of standards and their global market uptake rely on their technical quality and the significant legitimacy that results from the wide contribution of stakeholders to the standards-making processes. Therefore, the proposed organisational model should not undermine the inclusiveness of the European Standardisation System and the high-level of expertise given by the valuable participation of a plurality of industry experts in the ESOs, nor generate situations of delays in standardisation processes.

Therefore, we encourage co-legislators to preserve processes oriented towards sharing and consultation between stakeholders, NSBs and like-minded trading partners, which can help uphold our interests while maintaining a dynamic standardisation environment. In the same vein, it is crucial that the European Standardisation System remains committed and well-embedded in the international standardisation system, and that the changes in the governance do not lead to the decoupling of standards in areas where international standardisation is critical.
